

Get a Job IMPACT REPORT 2022/2023





Overview

The Get a Job programme has been designed to help young people understand how to apply for a job and secure an interview.

Students get to learn about the types of questions asked by employers, including how to answer competency-based questions. They are encouraged to start thinking about what they need to do to prepare for the recruitment process.

Taking into consideration previous feedback results, this academic year 22/23 the programme was updated, giving more emphasis to the elaboration of personal profiles, cover letters and how to put together a CV, which gives the students the opportunity to have a full CV done at the end of the programme.



Programme Footprint



4 Isle of Man High Schools

The programme was delivered in 4 Isle of Man High Schools: Castle Rushen High School, Queen Elizabeth II High School, Ramsey Grammar School and St Ninian's High School.

Learn to Earn was also booked to be delivered to Ballakermeen High School. However, it was cancelled because of the Teachers' Industrial Action.

802 Students

The programme was delivered to 802 students in year 10.



69 Volunteers

69 Volunteers from different industries in the Isle of Man donated 480 hours.



Students' Feedback

After completing the programme, randomly selected classrooms received feedback forms. These feedback forms help the Junior Achievement Team evaluate the relevance of the programme and to look for areas of improvement.


Feedback Results

73% of the students haven't had a job interview.

96%

of the students expressed that they feel more confident about applying for a job after completing the programme.





58% 58% knowledge about it. 88% programme.


of the students felt that they have enough knowledge to prepare for a job interview after completing the programme and **34%** acquired a basic knowledge about the interview topic.
